AMENDED ANALYSIS

This bill:

I. Adjusts the personal needs allowance for nursing home residents to reflect social security increases on an annual basis rather than the current 5-year adjustment.

II. Makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services to fund certain leave accrual and retention payments for temporary classified staff positions at the Hampstead hospital and residential treatment facility.

III. Establishes the Hampstead hospital and residential treatment facility capital investment fund and provides that all revenue collected by the department of health and human services from the operations transfer and asset purchase agreements approved by the governor and council on December 18, 2024 be deposited in the fund.

Amend RSA 659:44-a, III(b) as inserted by section 1 of the bill by replacing it with the following:

(b) Making public statements in favor of or against any candidate, political party or warrant article.

Amend RSA 659:44-a, IV as inserted by section 1 of the bill by inserting after subparagraph (e) the following new paragraph:

(f) Public employees who are appointed to office by the chief executive or governing body of the public employer from providing factual information in response to requests from the public concerning their official function.

Amend the bill by replacing all after section 1 with the following:

2 Absentee Voting; Application Forms. Amend RSA 657:4 to read as follows:

657:4 **Application Form** [Forms].

I. Prior to any state election, the secretary of state shall prepare the appropriate application forms for absentee ballots worded in substantially the following form. The secretary of state shall insert the names of all parties qualified as set forth in RSA 652:11 in the list of parties on the application form. The secretary of state shall prepare the application forms in such quantity as he or she deems necessary:

~~[Absence (Excluding Absence Due to Residence Outside the United States), Religious Observance, and Disability:~~

~~I hereby declare that] My Current Registration Status~~ (check one):

_____ I am a duly qualified voter who is currently registered to vote in this town/city ward (***Requires proof of identity***).

_____ ***I am registered in another New Hampshire town/city ward but am not currently registered to vote in this town/city ward where I am currently domiciled (Requires proof of identity and domicile). The town/city ward where I am registered is _____.***

_____ ***I am not currently registered to vote in any New Hampshire town/city ward and am and will be absent from the town/city where I am domiciled [and will be] until after the next election, or I am unable to register in person due to a disability, and request that the forms necessary for absentee voter registration be sent to me with the absentee ballot (Requires proof of identity, citizenship, age, and domicile).***

How I qualify to vote by absentee ballot (check one):

For use only on the Monday immediately prior to the election: I cannot appear at my polling place on election day **due to hazardous travel conditions** because the National Weather Service has issued a winter storm warning, blizzard warning, or ice storm warning for election day applicable to my city, town, or unincorporated place and either (check one):

_____ [~~I am elderly or infirm or I have a physical disability, and~~] **I** would otherwise vote in person but I have concerns for my safety traveling in the storm.

_____ I anticipate that school, child care, or adult care will be canceled, and would otherwise vote in person but will need to care for children or infirm adults.

Any person who votes or attempts to vote using an absentee ballot who is not entitled to vote by absentee ballot shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. RSA 657:24.

(c) Any person that violates this paragraph shall be subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$1,000, to be imposed in the manner set forth in RSA 659:34, III-V.

III. The federal official post card form shall constitute the form made available by the secretary of state pursuant to RSA 654:20 for absentee ballot applications by UOCAVA voters.

4) That I acknowledge that if I do not provide a copy of ~~[proof of identity and domicile]~~ ***the documentation*** as required by section 3) above, this application ~~[may]~~ ***shall*** not be approved; and

5) That I hereby make application for the addition of my name to the checklist of said town to be used at said election.

2 Submission; Effect. Amend RSA 654:19 to read as follows:

654:19 Submission; Effect. The applicant shall forward the absentee registration affidavit **with supporting documentation** and the applicant's voter registration form to the clerk of the town or city named for submission to the supervisors of the checklist. If the supervisors find that the affidavit **with supporting documentation** and the voter registration form are properly executed, they shall follow the procedure for applications made in person as provided in RSA 654:11, 654:13, and 654:15, except that in the case of an absentee voter they shall accept an absentee registration affidavit **with supporting documentation** and a registration form.

3 Verification of In-Person Absentee Voter. Amend RSA 657:17-a to read as follows:

657:17-a Verification of In-Person Absentee Voter.

I. An absentee voter who returns his or her completed absentee ballot to the clerk's office in person shall be treated as a verified voter provided[:]

~~[(a) The]~~ **that the** voter voluntarily shows the clerk a photo identification that meets the requirements of RSA 659:13[; ~~or~~

~~(b) The voter voluntarily completes a challenged voter affidavit in the same manner as is required for an election day voter who does not present a qualified voter identification].~~

II. The clerk shall mark the absentee ballot affidavit enveloped "voter verified" and note on the clerk's list of absentee voters that the voter has been verified. The verified voter's signatures on the application for an absentee ballot shall not be compared to the voter's signature on the absentee ballot affidavit on election day.

III. A voter who does not present a qualified photo identification ~~[and who does not complete a challenged voter affidavit]~~ shall not be treated as a verified voter, and his or her signatures on the application for an absentee ballot shall be compared to his or her signature on the absentee ballot affidavit on election day in the same manner as other absentee voters.

4 Absentee Ballots and Related Materials; Outer Envelopes. Amend RSA 657:7, II and III to read as follows:

II. Affidavit envelopes of sufficient size to contain the ballots on which shall be printed the following:

YOUR COMPLETED ABSENTEE BALLOT MUST BE SEALED IN THIS ENVELOPE

I do hereby certify under the penalties for voting fraud set forth below that:

I am a voter in the city or town of _____, New Hampshire.

One of the following applies to me:

1) I will be absent on election day. Absence includes:

a) I will be out-of-town on election day.

b) I will be unable to vote in person because I will be working.

c) I will be unable to vote in person because I will be caring for children or infirm adults, with or without compensation.

d) I am voting absentee on the Monday immediately before the election, the National Weather Service has issued a winter storm warning, blizzard warning, or ice storm warning that applies to my town/ward, and I have concerns for traveling in the storm.

2) I am unable to vote in person due to disability.

3) I am unable to vote in person due to observance of a religious commitment, which prevents me from voting in person.

4) I am confined to a penal institution for a misdemeanor or while awaiting trial.

I have carefully read or had read to me the absentee voting instructions. I personally marked the absentee ballot enclosed in this envelope or, due to a disability, I had assistance in marking the absentee ballot.

Fraudulently registering to vote or voting is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$5,000.

III. Return envelopes of size sufficient to contain the preceding envelope addressed to the town and city clerks of the state in which absentee voters shall return their ballots, ***if such ballots are returned by mail***. On the envelopes shall be printed "Enclosed is the ballot of an absentee voter" and, at the top thereof, 4 blank spaces with the words "Name, Voting Address, Ward, Town or City" appropriately printed thereon. ***Absentee ballots returned to town or city clerks in person shall not be required to be placed in such outer envelopes.***

5 Absentee Voting; Refusal to Certify; Procedure. Amend RSA 657:16 to read as follows:

657:16 Refusal to Certify; Procedure. If he or she refuses to certify the application, the town or city clerk shall notify the applicant in writing within 7 days to that effect. The town or city clerk shall provide the applicant with an absentee ballot and a notice that the ballot will not be counted unless the applicant submits the documents necessary to complete an absentee registration. The applicant shall be advised in writing what documents, if any, have been received in proper form and which the applicant must submit. ***If the applicant submits such documents via mail, he or she shall do so by enclosing them*** in the outer envelope that contains the absentee ballot envelope. ***An applicant hand delivering such documents need not enclose them in the outer envelope.*** The town or city clerk shall mark the absentee ballot application, the absentee ballot affidavit, and the outer envelope, ***if applicable***, with the words "Not Registered." Upon receipt of [an] ***a mailed*** outer envelope marked "Not Registered," the clerk shall open the outer envelope. If the applicant returns the required documents with the absentee ballot by the date set for correcting the checklist under RSA 654:27 and RSA 654:28, the town or city clerk shall forward the registration forms to the supervisors of the checklist and, if the applicant is found to be qualified, the applicant shall be registered and his or her absentee ballot shall be processed in the same manner as the absentee ballot of a previously registered voter. All documents received after the deadline for correcting the checklist under RSA 654:27 and RSA 654:28 shall be processed as election day registrations under RSA 654:7-a. If the ballot is returned without the required documents in proper form, the ballot shall be marked in the manner set forth by law for successfully challenged absentee ballots and preserved in accordance with RSA 33-A:3-a. The clerk shall preserve the application of any applicant who is not registered as a voter until the time set by law for the destruction of the ballots after the election at which time the application shall be destroyed. Any justice of the superior court has jurisdiction in equity upon such notice as he or she may order to require that the name of the person making application for an absentee ballot be placed upon the checklist or registered as a member of any party and be sent an absentee ballot.

6 Absentee Voting; Procedure by Voter. Amend RSA 657:17, I to read as follows:

I. After marking the ballot, the voter or the person assisting a blind voter or voter with a disability who is unable to mark his or her ballot shall enclose and seal the same in an inner envelope. The voter shall execute the affidavit on the envelope. A person assisting a blind voter or voter with a disability who needs assistance executing the affidavit shall sign a statement on the affidavit envelope acknowledging the assistance. ***If the voter or the person assisting the blind voter or voter with a disability who needs assistance is mailing the absentee ballot to the town or city clerk, the voter or the person assisting the blind voter or voter with a disability shall enclose and seal the [inner] envelope with the affidavit and return it to the town/ city clerk. If the envelope with the affidavit is mailed it shall be sealed in [an] the outer envelope provided.*** The voter or the person assisting a blind voter or voter with a disability shall then endorse on the outer envelope the voter's name, address, and voting place. The absentee ballot shall be delivered to the city or town clerk from whom it was received in one of the following ways:

(a) The voter or the voter's delivery agent may personally deliver the envelope, ***in which case the voter or the voter's delivery agent need not enclose the affidavit envelope in the outer envelope***; or

(b) The voter or the person assisting the blind voter or voter with a disability may mail the **ballot and affidavit envelope within the outer** envelope to the city or town clerk, with postage affixed.

7 Absentee Voting; Procedure by Clerk. Amend RSA 657:18 to read as follows:

657:18 Procedure by Clerk. Upon receipt of an outer envelope **or an affidavit envelope** purporting to contain an official absentee voting ballot, the clerk of the city or town shall, subject to RSA 657:16, attach thereto the application for an absentee ballot **to the envelope** submitted by said voter and record the information pursuant to RSA 657:15. ~~[All such envelopes]~~ **The envelopes** shall be preserved unopened until ~~[election day]~~ **processed in accordance with RSA 659:50.**

8 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

BILLS REMOVED FROM THE CONSENT CALENDAR
COMMITTEE OF CONFERENCE REPORT ON SB 14-FN**

Committee of Conference Report on SB 14-FN, relative to the penalty for certain fentanyl-related offenses.
Recommendation:

That the Senate recede from its position of nonconcurrence with the House amendment, and concur with the House amendment, and

That the Senate and House adopt the following new amendment to the bill as amended by the House, and pass the bill as so amended:

Amend the bill by replacing all after the enacting clause with the following:

1 Controlled Drug Act; Penalties. Amend RSA 318-B:26, I(a) to read as follows:

(a) In the case of a violation involving any of the following, a person shall be sentenced to a maximum term of imprisonment of not more than 30 years, a fine of not more than \$500,000, or both. If any person commits such a violation after one or more prior offenses as defined in RSA 318-B:27, such person may be sentenced to a maximum term of life imprisonment, a fine of not more than \$500,000, or both:

(1) Five ounces or more of a mixture or substance containing any of the following, including any adulterants or dilutants:

(A) Coca leaves, except coca leaves and extracts of coca leaves from which cocaine, ecgonine, and derivatives of ecgonine or their salts have been removed; or

(B) Cocaine other than crack cocaine, its salts, optical and geometric isomers, and salts of isomers; or

(C) Ecgonine, its derivatives, their salts, isomers, and salts of isomers.

(2) Lysergic acid diethylamide, or its analog, in a quantity of 100 milligrams or more including any adulterants or dilutants, or phencyclidine (PCP), or its analog, in a quantity of 10 grams or more including any adulterants or dilutants.

(3) Heroin or its analog, crack cocaine, or a fentanyl class drug in a quantity of 5 grams or more, including any adulterants or dilutants.

(A) A fentanyl class drug in a quantity of 20 grams or more, including any adulterants or dilutants, shall carry a minimum term of imprisonment of not less than 3 years and 6 months incarceration. A fentanyl class drug in a quantity of 50 grams or more, including any adulterants or dilutants, shall carry a minimum term of imprisonment of not less than 7 years incarceration. If a defendant charged under this subparagraph cooperates with a law enforcement investigation which results in an arrest or conviction, the defendant shall not be subject to the minimum term of imprisonment outlined in this subparagraph. The court may not defer, combine, or run concurrently with any other sentence the mandatory minimum unless:

(i) The offender was less than 18 years of age at the time of the commission of the offense for which the offender is to be sentenced;

(ii) The offender's mental capacity, at the time of the commission of the offense for which the offender is to be sentenced, was significantly impaired to the extent that the defendant was deemed incompetent. However, a voluntarily induced intoxicated or drugged condition may not be considered an impairment for the purposes of this subparagraph; or

(iii) The offender was an accomplice, the conduct constituting the offense was principally the conduct of another, and the offender's participation was relatively minor.

(4) Methamphetamine or its analog, in a quantity of 5 ounces or more, including adulterants or dilutants.

2 Controlled Drug Act; Penalties. Amend RSA 318-B:26, IX to read as follows:

IX. Any person who manufactures, sells, or dispenses methamphetamine, lysergic acid[;] diethylamide (**LSD**), phencyclidine (PCP) or any other controlled drug classified in schedules I or II, or any controlled drug analog thereof, in violation of RSA 318-B:2, I or I-a, **excluding any fentanyl class drug, including any adulterants or dilutants**, is strictly liable for a death which results from the injection, inhalation, or ingestion of that substance, and may be sentenced to imprisonment for life or for such term as the court may order. **Any person who manufactures, sells, or dispenses a fentanyl class drug, including any adulterants or dilutants, in violation of RSA 318-B:2, I or I-a, is strictly liable for a death which results from the injection, inhalation, or ingestion of that substance, and may be sentenced to imprisonment for life or for such term as the court may order, except that such term shall not be less than 5 years of imprisonment.** For purposes of this section, the person's act of manufacturing, dispensing, or selling a substance is the cause of a death when:

(a) The injection, inhalation or ingestion of the substance is an antecedent but for which the death would not have occurred; and

(b) The death was not:

(1) Too remote in its occurrence as to have just bearing on the person's liability; or

(2) Too dependent upon conduct of another person which was unrelated to the injection, inhalation or ingestion of the substance or its effect, as to have a just bearing on the person's liability. It shall not be a defense to a prosecution under this section that the decedent contributed to his own death by his purposeful, knowing, reckless or negligent injection, inhalation or ingestion of the substance or by his consenting to the administration of the substance by another. Nothing in this section shall be construed to preclude or limit any prosecution for homicide. A conviction arising under this section shall not merge with a conviction of one as a drug enterprise leader or for any other offense defined in this chapter.

3 New Section; Personal Possession of Psilocybin. Amend RSA 318-B by inserting after section 2-e the following new section:

318-B:2-f Personal Possession of Psilocybin.

I. Notwithstanding RSA 318-B:2 and 318-B:26, a person 18 years of age or older who obtains, purchases, transports, possesses, or uses 3/4 of an ounce or less of psilocybin shall be subject to the following penalties:

(a) For a first offense, a misdemeanor.

(b) For a second or subsequent offense, the person shall be subject to the penalties in RSA 318-B:26.

II. Any person under 18 years of age who obtains, purchases, transports, possesses, or uses psilocybin shall be subject to the penalties in RSA 318-B:26.

4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect January 1, 2026.

DEBATE ON SB 14-FN

REP. NEWELL

Representative Newell: Thank you, Mister Speaker. I have had some folks ask me why I'm so passionate about this and I thought I would give a little bit of insight into that today. Kory was everything to me. He was my rock, my protector and my best friend, but Kory had his demons. A couple months after our youngest was born, Kory was pulled over and the police discovered heroin and a bag of OxyContin, eight of which he had already consumed. I'll never forget that phone call. I hardly recognized his voice. The next day his family and I picked him up from the courthouse. As the two of us walked back to our car, he stopped, crumbled into a ball on the curb, holding my hand in both of his and begged me to forgive him and I did. I stood by him in court, at AA meetings, at the clinic and it was hard. He lost his job when he went into detox. We were in court every few weeks facing a mandatory minimum prison sentence. We lived under constant threat that the consequences of Kory's addiction would be a decade of our children without their father. I say we because we faced it together. Our family's future hung in the balance. I also say we because the stigma was strong and it wasn't just limited to him. After nine tumultuous months, Kory lost his battle with addiction. On Christmas Eve 2008, he overdosed just 10' from our son and I on the other side of a closed door. When he didn't respond, I busted in that door with a nine-month pregnant belly. I tried to revive him with CPR. I delivered our youngest two weeks later, clutching pictures of the happy, little family I had thought we would be welcoming him into. The night before Kory passed, I dropped him off at the program he was attending to get and stay well. Later that night he recorded the van full of folks singing under the bridge. In my grief and distress, I wanted an explanation. I wanted resolution, and if I'm being honest, I wanted someone to blame. It occurred to me that these were the last, these voices were the last people he was with before he came home. So I became obsessed with finding out who gave him the heroin and eventually I found them. The thing is, finding that person didn't give me the peace that I thought it would. Rather, finding them gave me a face. It was a face of a person I didn't know, but a person all the same. A human being who was struggling much in the same way that Kory did. Meeting that person didn't make me want them to suffer or rot in jail. Instead of wanting to continue blaming them, report them, to pursue some type of retribution, all it made me feel was empathy and sorrow. I wanted to help them. This bill would impose a mandatory minimum on possession of what many people who testified in our committee said was at one point in their lives a weekend supply. A mandatory minimum for anyone who sold or gave drugs to someone who dies of any overdose. I think that if anybody in New Hampshire would feel that this is justified, it would probably be someone like me whose loved one died of an overdose. But, having been through that, I learned exactly the opposite. I learned that doubling down on criminalization only serves to perpetuate a punitive mentality that assigns malice to hurting people, people whose desire to relieve pain manifest in this particular way. So, rather than double down on this failed strategy, I humbly ask that you vote against this horrible bill.

MOTION TO PRINT DEBATE

Rep. McFarlane moved that the motion to print debate on **HB 377-FN**, relative to health care professionals administering hormone treatments and puberty blockers and relative to recognizing the second Thursday in October as children's environmental health day be amended to include the entire debate to be printed in the Permanent Journal.

Without objection, the Speaker ordered.

DEBATE ON HB 377-FN

Representative Wheeler: Thank you, Mister Speaker. In his own words, Chase Strangio, the lawyer for the ACLU in the Skrmetti case says, "I am a constitutional lawyer who does not believe in the constitution." The gist of Strangio's argument to the supreme court in favor of overturning Tennessee's ban on puberty blockers and sex change hormones for minor children was that a teenager who was assigned male at birth, a boy, can be prescribed testosterone to receive a form of gender affirming care. That a teenager who was

assigned female at birth, a girl, should have access to the same hormone. In one situation, the use of blockers and testosterone is to correct a real medical condition that interferes with natural puberty. On the other hand, the use of blockers and testosterone is for a sex change rooted in a psychological feeling that cannot be objectively measured. WPATH is the World Professional Association for Transgender Health. They are the leading figure in this world, and they measure those feelings by what's used, by what's called the DSM-5. The criteria through which the DSM-5 makes these determinations are questions as pedantic as did you use trucks, or did you play with tea sets? Did you like blocks or do you like Barbies? As if you could reduce being a woman to liking Barbies or blocks or a boy to liking monster trucks or tea time, but that's what the criteria in the DSM-5 is. During discovery for the Alabama case dealing with the same issue, we found out that WPATH knowingly was saying things that were untrue about these procedures, knowingly, and we only found out about that after discovery. These are not the stringent criteria in which we were told that it is. On Monday, the European Society for Psychiatric Health just put out a study that said that the impacts of estrogen in males led to a 26 times higher risk of testicular cancer, a 40 times higher risk of breast cancer, cognitive impairments, and autoimmune diseases. This is but one of many studies that have come out over the course of the last year which show that these procedures are not as medically affirming as people have made them out to seem. Mister Speaker, as a matter of principle, I believe in live and let live. And Mister Speaker, if you are of the legal age of majority, which is 18 years old, I believe live and let live. You're able to do whatever you'd like to do with your body as long as it doesn't hurt another individual or impede on their life. But if you are under the age of majority, if you are in the legal age of minority, if you're under the age of 18 years old, I do not believe that you should be taking substances which stop the natural process of puberty to affirm a feeling that you might have. I urge my colleagues to vote for the Committee of Conference report, and I'm going to end by saying what is probably the most controversial statement that I have made here at this well. Nobody is born in the wrong body. Everybody is beautiful. No matter if you are short and stout, tall and lean, whether you're black or you're white, whether you're a feminine man or a masculine woman, nobody has the right to say that you aren't beautiful as you were created. Immutable characteristics are your immutable characteristics, and you're beautiful as you are. Don't let anyone tell you otherwise. Everybody is born in the right body. Thank you, Mister Speaker.

Speaker Packard: Does the member yield to questions?

Representative Wheeler: I do.

Speaker Packard: Member yields. You may inquire.

Representative Foss: Thank you, Mister Speaker. I'm just curious. The representative from Peterborough mentioned the DSM-5 and non tangible criteria and the DSM. So, for example, a child has ADHD, and so the fact that you can't...

Speaker Packard: The member will suspend. You were recognized for a question.

Representative Foss: So I'm just curious, does the fact that you can't use tangible measures of ADHD, does that mean that a child should not receive treatment for ADHD?

Representative Wheeler: It's irrelevant and I didn't bring anything up to the sort, but nice try.

Speaker Packard: The House will be in order. The Chair recognizes Rep. Wade.

Representative Wade: Thank you, Mister Speaker. I rise in opposition to HB 377 for the final time this year. A few weeks ago, I attended a cookout with some friends, and I met a young trans person in middle school who wanted to know more about my experience and the path that laid ahead of them. I still remember being in their shoes when I was young and I was so happy to see that they were already comfortable enough to be open about who they are with their friends and family. It took me many more years to reach that point. At one point, the conversation landed on hormone therapy, and I shared my experience, how it turned my entire life around and how I only wish I could have started it sooner. I answered their questions about the physical and emotional changes, the differences between puberty blockers and hormone therapy, insurance, and how challenging it is already to get a prescription. I spoke with their mom as well. She asked thoughtful questions, wanted to learn more, and told me she would do anything she could to help her child live happily. Eventually, the conversation landed on this bill, HB 377. If this bill passes, her child wouldn't be able to begin therapy for years because she's a few months too young to start treatment before this arbitrary deadline. So I ask all of you what part of this bill supports allowing parents to make the best healthcare decisions for their children? We have heard time and time again this Session, even on the previous bill, that parents should have the final say about their children and their child's health. And here we are, taking away lifesaving healthcare options for all parents, parents who consulted medical professionals, who know their children best and who want to support them. I used to live in Tennessee, and if my mom hadn't taken a job in Manchester in 2015, I don't think I'd be alive today to tell you this story, because hormone therapy is banned there now. Just last week, the federal government announced that they would be ending 988 emergency suicide hotline services for LGBTQ+ people. At one point in my life, I had to call that hotline. We know that legislation like HB 377 has been tied to a 72% increase in suicide attempts in trans people. In states with these bans, the number of hate crimes against children has quadrupled. Proponents of these bans have claimed that what LGBTQ+

youth need is adequate mental health support. The move from this current administration is doing the exact opposite. What part of that is helping our constituents? I have said it before, and I will say it again, our constituents do not support this bill. Out of the thousands of testimony submissions on this bill, 90% of them opposed, 90%. You don't have to understand this care to agree that these decisions should be left to families and medical professionals. We seem to have lost the principle of minding our damn business. I've taken hormone therapy medication every day since November 11, 2018. Under HB 377, a doctor could prescribe the exact same treatment to a cisgender teen, but not to someone like me. That is not parental rights. It's just discrimination, plain and simple. There's no other way to interpret that. Please join me in voting against HB 377. Thank you, Mister Speaker, and I request a roll call vote.

Speaker Packard: The Chair recognizes Rep. Mazur.

Representative Mazur: Thank you, Mister Speaker. As you all know, the House passed HB 377, a bill that would prohibit harmful puberty blockers and cross sex hormones for children. The other body amended the bill, so we took it to a Committee of Conference to work on it. The other body made some changes, including the addition of a private course of action so that an individual can sue a provider for any injuries sustained through these treatments that will deter a lot of providers from even starting children on them moving forward. They also amended it to allow healthcare providers to continue any treatments that were initiated prior to January 1, 2026, and recognize the second Thursday in October as Children's Environmental Health Day, which we also concurred with. The end result is this. As of the new year, providers will no longer be allowed to prescribe these harmful drugs to kids in New Hampshire moving forward, and that's what's important. The day after this was agreed upon in the Committee of Conference, the US Supreme Court ruled in the landmark *Skrmetti* case that it is now legal and constitutional for states to regulate and or ban the use of these harmful drugs in minors. This ruling implicitly supports the argument that children and adolescents are not capable of giving fully informed consent to these body and life altering medical procedures. Much like laws surrounding tattoos, alcohol, tanning salons, or other age-restricted activities, this decision reinforces that states can act to protect minors from making harmful or irreversible choices while their bodies and identities are still developing. And New Hampshire is acting. Even before this court decision, several renowned hospitals started closing their gender clinics, not out of politics, but because of evidence-based concerns about the safety, reversibility, and long-term outcomes of gender medical interventions in minors. Anyone who calls this life-saving healthcare is not paying attention to the actual evidence. Our state is taking a firm stand to safeguard children through this underlying bill, and that decision is now backed by the highest court in the nation. I urge my colleagues to support the committee report by pressing the green button. Thank you.

Speaker Packard: Rep. Mazur has requested a roll call. Is that sufficiently seconded? It is sufficiently seconded. This will be a roll call vote. Members take your seats. The motion before us is the adoption of the Committee of Conference report on HB 377. This is a roll call vote. The Chair recognizes Rep. Weber for a parliamentary inquiry.

Representative Weber: Thank you, Mister Speaker. Mister Speaker, If I pay attention to the years and years of medical evidence. If I pay attention to the voices of adult trans people who were once children, and for trans children who hope to become adults. And, if I know that gender affirming care saves lives, and if I further know that we should trust parents to make the best decisions for their own children, would I now press the red button?

Speaker Packard: The Chair recognizes Rep. Mazur for a parliamentary inquiry.

Representative Mazur: Thank you, Mister Speaker. If I know anything, it's that kids need protection, not irreversible treatments and with added legal accountability, this bill puts real safeguards in place starting January 1, 2026. And if I know our legal system, I know the supreme court ruling in *Skrmetti* confirms states can and will protect minors from harmful medical procedures. And if I know the science, I know the risks are real. Major hospitals are backing away from these treatments based on new evidence coming out daily. And lastly, if I know this bill is about facts, not politics, and protecting...

Speaker Packard: The House will be in order.

Representative Mazur: And protecting New Hampshire's children comes first, would I then press the green button to accept the committee report and send this on to the governor? Thank you.

Speaker Packard: The motion before us is to adopt the Committee of Conference report on HB 377. This is a roll call vote. If you're in favor, you'll press the green button. If you're opposed, you'll press the red button. Voting stations are open for 30 seconds. Have all members present had an opportunity to vote? The House will attend to the state of the vote. 202 voting Yea, 161 voting Nay, the committee report is adopted.

and the Committee of Conference Report was adopted.

DEBATE ON HB 712-FN

Speaker Steven Smith: Rep. Alissandra Murray is recognized to speak against the motion.

Representative Alissandra Murray: Thank you, Mister Speaker. I stand before you today deeply concerned about this bill, HB 712, legislation that would ban top surgery for minors in New Hampshire, allowing it only in cases of cancer, injury, or malformations, unless you're a cisgender boy and you want to get breast reduction. Let's be clear, this bill does not protect teenagers. It strips away their rights, overrides the judgment of their parents, and undermines the doctor-patient relationship. Right now, qualified medical professionals follow rigorous protocols under nationally accepted standards of care. Countless young people have endured years of therapy, counseling, and hormone treatment before even being considered for surgery. What this legislation and this legislature is saying, parents of cisgender teens have rights, but parents of trans teens do not. Medical experts and families across our state, including Dartmouth Health, report that no top surgeries are currently performed on minors in New Hampshire. That means this legislation is not closing a dangerous loophole. It's a solution in search of a problem. Worse, it further establishes a dangerous precedent where legislators, not physicians or parents, dictate medical care. Crucial elements for healthy development, like support, trust, and autonomy, are undercut when we tell young trans Granite Staters that their needs don't matter. These youth already face disproportionate rates of isolation, anxiety, and suicide. Numerous families testified that access to affirming care including top surgery is rare, but critical cases can be lifesaving. In 2022, over 84,000 trans, non-binary, and gender non-conforming people were surveyed, which is the largest survey of trans people ever. Of these respondents who had transitioned, 9% had gone back to living as their sex assigned at birth at some point in their lives, at least for a short while. But in almost every single case, the reason was anti-trans discrimination from one's family, friends, or community. Only 4% of these people stated that gender transition was not for them. When considering all respondents who had transitioned, the number of regrets equates to 0.36%. Meanwhile, respondents who received gender-affirming hormone therapy or gender-affirming surgery overwhelmingly reported feeling more satisfied with their lives. Data has just

demonstrably proven that gender-affirming surgeries not only have a low rate of regret, but also one of the lowest rates of regret amongst all surgeries. A total of 27 studies conducted by the American Society of Plastic Surgeons, pooling together 7,928 transgender patients who underwent any type of gender-affirming surgery, concluded that the prevalence of regret after gender assignment surgery was less than 1%. In clearer terms, 99.7% of trans individuals were satisfied with their surgery. Meanwhile, up to 30% of individuals who undergo knee surgery experience regret, up to 25% of people regret getting heart surgery, 30% report regret after a prostatectomy, and 19.5% express regret after bariatric surgery. Yet, all of these procedures are still legal. The reality is that top surgery is already difficult to access for a multitude of reasons. Despite what some of my colleagues might say, gatekeeping and combative attitudes in healthcare are a very real barrier to accessing gender-affirming care. Often, trans people have to spend years proving who they are, who they say they are, in order to access treatment. The financial, social, and mental burdens this causes actually increases their chances of detransition. This issue is not rooted in ideology or social contagion. It's about individual lives, guided by trusted medical professionals and supported by loving families and this bill erases that nuance. It offers no path for those whose gender-affirming care is thoughtfully prescribed and carefully managed. This past Sunday, I stood in a room full of trans youth and their loving family members as we mourned the Skrmetti ruling and tried to provide each other with hope and comfort. But after speaking at this well and in committee over and over again the past three years, sharing deeply personal experiences and feelings that I had never talked about before with anyone before I was elected, I'm not going to lie. I don't feel heard. I feel dismissed. I feel devalued. And I struggle to reconcile the good relationships I have with so many of you with your insistence to continue to vote against my rights. Imagine how those teenagers and young adults who have done the same feel right now. Literally hundreds of Granite Staters have told their stories and begged you not to pass this legislation, to see our humanity, to listen to us, to understand, to listen to understand. And over and over again, the majority of this body has decided to ignore constituents and vote to deny trans people health care, to deny us our humanity, and to deny us our dignity. In a state that cherishes live free or die, we must ask, are we truly living free when we restrict families' medical decisions? Are we preserving life when we legislate away options that have been proven to protect it? Are we really a body that represents the people when we consistently ignore the voices of our own constituents? Please stand with me and reject HB 712 and affirm that New Hampshire is a state where parents, doctors, and children, together, not politicians, guide health care decisions. Let us protect the rights, dignity, and futures of our youngest citizens, no matter their identities, and let us stop this era of terror that is wreaking havoc on the lives of LGBTQ Granite Staters. We are better than this.

Speaker Steven Smith: Rep. Mazur is recognized to speak.

Representative Mazur: Thank you, Mister Speaker. You've heard me speak on this before, so I'm here to speak to the committee report. I rise in support of the Committee of Conference report on a bill that reflects a shared commitment to transparency, accountability, and the protection of vulnerable populations, especially minors. As introduced in the House, this bill originally sought to limit breast surgeries for all minors, with appropriate medical exceptions. Through collaboration between the House and the other body conferees, an agreement was reached on four critical points. First, a clear and specific definition of transgender chest surgery was established, ensuring the law is applied consistently and fairly. Second, RSA 329 was amended to uphold the right of an aggrieved individual to seek recourse through the courts if this statute is violated, adding an essential layer of accountability. Third, the other body's language was adopted to add a new section to RSA 329, which enhances the collection and reporting of abortion statistics by health care providers and medical facilities, with clear consequences for non-compliance and false reporting. Lastly, this bill makes important reforms to improve transparency and accountability in residential care and health facility licensing. This final version of the bill is a balanced step forward. It limits invasive and irreversible surgeries on children, reinforces data transparency in reproductive health, and raises standards in our residential care system. As a reminder, the U.S. Supreme Court just ruled this underlying bill constitutional and legal as well, as it protects all children, and New Hampshire must act now to do so. I urge my colleagues to support this important legislation by voting green on the committee report. Thank you.

Speaker Steven Smith: The question is on the adoption of the Committee of Conference report on HB 712. Are you ready for the question? Who asked for it? Rep. Telerski requests a roll call. Will that be? Yep, sufficiently seconded. This is a roll call vote. Members take your seats. The question is on the adoption of the Committee of Conference report on HB 712 and Rep. Weber is recognized for a parliamentary inquiry.

Representative Weber: Thank you, Mister Speaker. Mister Speaker, if I know that I have heard loud and clear the voices of our trans citizens who are adults, who were once children. And I heard loud and clear the voice of trans children who would like to live to become adults. And, if I know that gender-affirming care is lifesaving and life-enhancing care, and if I know that parents are the best judge of the important medical decisions with respect to their children, all parents, not just some parents, would I now press the red button to defeat this cruel and unnecessary bill?

Speaker Steven Smith: Rep. Mazur is recognized for parliamentary inquiry.

Representative Mazur: Thank you, Mister Speaker. If I know what good care looks like, it means raising standards. And, as amended, this bill improves oversight in residential facilities and makes inspection results public, protecting those who need it the most. And if I know transparency, it means tracking the facts, and by strengthening abortion data reporting, this amended bill ensures providers are accountable and the public stays informed. And lastly, if I know that children cannot consent to body and life-altering surgeries, and that the underlying bill gives harmed individuals the right to take legal action, would I then press the green button to accept the committee report?

Speaker Steven Smith: The question is on the adoption of the Committee of Conference report on House Bill 712. It's a roll call vote. If you're in favor, press the green button; opposed, press the red. Voting stations are open for 30 seconds. Have all members present had an opportunity to vote? The House will attend to the state of the vote. 191 in the affirmative, 163 in the negative, the report is adopted.

ADJOURN FROM THE EARLY SESSION

Rep. Osborne offered the following: RESOLVED, that the House now adjourn from the early session, that the business of the late session be in order at the present time and when the House adjourns today it be to meet at the Call of the Chair.

REMARKS

Representative Hakken-Phillips: Thank you, Mister Speaker. Mister Speaker, I rise to congratulate the Grafton County Bar Association, the longest continuously active bar association in the Western Hemisphere, on its June 10th spring meeting and its unanimously approved statement in support of the rule of law. Which states, "The Grafton County Bar Association joins the American Bar Association and other legal organizations nationwide in vigorously supporting and respecting the rule of law. The GCBA promotes access to justice and is committed to the fair and impartial legal system that protects the rights and safety of all people. The GCBA supports diverse opinions and perspectives, but above all, supports the rule of law and the legal system, which is the bedrock of our system of government. As lawyers, we swore an oath to protect the law. Courts play an integral part in upholding the rule of law, and the independence and safety of justices are paramount to an effective legal system. Lawyers are also essential in maintaining the rule of law and should not be punished or threatened for advancing their clients' interests in court. The GCBA calls upon all branches of our government to adhere to the rule of law and our constitution and respect the legal processes and procedures of our judicial system." As a member of the GCBA, I am very proud of this statement because it is the first of its kind in New Hampshire. It exemplifies the leadership and integrity of this distinguished body. But as fate would have it, the GCBA would not stand alone for long. On June 18th, the New Hampshire Bar Association Board of Governors' individual officers published their own statement on the rule of law and the New Hampshire Bar News, which states in part, "We affirm our commitment to the rule of law which serves as the cornerstone of a just and democratic society. We emphasize the respect for legal institutions, adherence to due process, and the impartial administration of justice are essential principles that safeguard the rights and liberties of all individuals. Central to this framework is the constitutional right of habeas corpus, the fundamental guarantee that no person may be detained unlawfully and that courts must have the authority to review the legality of a person's imprisonment. This principle enshrined in both the US and the New Hampshire Constitutions serve as a critical check on the power of this state and protects individuals from arbitrary detention. We also express grave concern over the rise in threats and intimidation directed toward judges and members of the judiciary. Such actions are not only dangerous, they are antithetical to the principles of democracy. An independent and impartial judiciary is essential to the rule of law. Attempts to undermine the safety, independence, or credibility of judges erode public trust in our legal system and weaken the very foundation of our constitutional democracy. We will remain vigilant in defending the rule of law and protecting the constitutional right of habeas corpus. We will work to support and safeguard the independence and security of the judiciary. In doing so, we protect not only the rights of individuals, but also the integrity and strength of our democratic institutions." As a member of the New Hampshire Bar Association, I extend my congratulations to the state bar individual officers on their collective leadership as well in this statement. Finally, Mister Speaker, I invite my colleagues of the General Court to reflect on the rise in threats and intimidation directed towards state legislators across our country. Each one of us has a critical role to play as elected officials in our democracy, and each one of us has sworn an

oath to uphold the New Hampshire and the US Constitutions. Therefore, I call upon you, Mister Speaker, and my colleagues to join these efforts to lend your voices and to stand for the rule of law as these honorable leaders have exemplified before us. Let us meet the moment demanded of us together on behalf of the people of the Granite State. Thank you, Mister Speaker.

REMARKS

Representative Harriott-Gathright: Thank you, Mister Speaker. If anyone is for Juneteenth, if you'd like to join me, please do join. Thank you, colleagues. The document that I'm going to speak from is some of my words, but it's also from an interview that was done at the New Hampshire Center for Justice and Equity and a very dear friend that some of you might know from Manchester, Woullard Lett, was being interviewed. So it starts with each June, communities across the United States gather to celebrate Juneteenth, a blend of June and 19th, as the end of the slavery in the US, but few people know the full history of the end of slavery. In a conversation that happened with the center, Education Committee Chair of the Manchester NAACP and the Co-Chair of the New England Chapter of the National Coalition of Blacks for Reparations, clarified the full story of Juneteenth. Mainstream historical accounts of Juneteenth depicted it as the day in 1865 when the last remaining enslaved black Americans became free after Union soldiers arrived in Galveston, Texas with the news of emancipation, highlight the uplifting parts of the story while glossing over uncomfortable truths about the legacy of African chattel enslavement in America. This article is an effort to reclaim the whole story and invite a more honest reckoning with history. By acknowledging the contradictions within the document, the dominant narratives, we create space for deeper understanding and ensure we don't repeat the past. Mr. Lett, understanding Juneteenth requires examining the long and layered history of African chattel enslavement in the United States and faces a deeper truth about the nation's founding. His perspective is grounded in the observation that there were two Civil Wars in North America, he stated. The dynamics that brought about the first war, American Revolutionary War, are very similar to the dynamics at the base of the second Civil War, American Civil War, which was the enslavers taking up arms to defend their economic position in society. Both conflicts were shaped by tensions and were a powerful economic interest that resists the threat of ending enslavement. The Emancipation Proclamation, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1st, 1863, announcing that all persons held as slaves within the rebellious areas are henceforth free. It reveals the moral and strategic contradictions of the Civil War era. Many people don't realize that when President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, it was only for the Confederate States. Those states that belonged to the Union had legalized African chattel enslavement like Delaware, Maryland, Kentucky, were to have enslaved people. Enslavement was only made illegal six months later on December 6th of 1865 when Georgia became the 27th state to ratify the 13th Amendment, fulfilling the requirements that three quarters of the states approve of a constitutional amendment. And even then, those formerly enslaved were not granted U.S. citizenship until the passage of the 14th Amendment in 1868. So, in the observation that there were two Civil Wars in North America, the dynamics that brought about the first war, American Revolutionary War, are very similar to the dynamics and at the base of the second Civil War, American Civil War. Okay, making space for the contradictions of American history, it is argued that the primary function of the Emancipation Proclamation was to destabilize the economy of the Confederate States, which relied on the exploitation of enslaved people and consolidate the Union's war effort. Frederick Douglass, a prominent abolitionist of African descent, was a big advocate for including men of African descent in the Union Army. It was only from fear of losing the war that people of African descent were allowed to serve as Union soldiers. The Emancipation Proclamation wasn't so much a moral document as a military one. The first 12 Presidents of the United States were enslavers, even the author of the Declaration of Independence. But rather than casting judgment, we encourage a more complex, honest reckoning with history, particularly when it comes to commemorating holidays like Juneteenth. Part of the challenge that we face today is the cultural tendency to look at things in a binary way, where either you're good or bad, but we're all complex people and walking contradictions. The same is true of the American experience. Let's urge to place Juneteenth within a broader historical continuum instead of treating it as a static moment in time. It's important for us to mark significant occurrences in our lives and history. We have to contextualize it in a way that doesn't result in detaching it from the experience and the history that came before. Miss Nolette draws comparisons to how we treat Black History Month as a compartmentalized ritual that often feels dis-

connected from a deeper understanding of the role that people of African descent have played in shaping the nation. We must understand that black history is American history. A similar thing is true about Juneteenth. It's not something that should only be an interest in people of African descent. The same can be said about equity. It is not just the responsibility or concern of communities of color, but a test of our collective moral compass. We are all part of the American experience and experiment and the human family. Unless we are able to figure out what we have in common and work together on those interests, then we all lose. Today's political economic realities highlight these common interests. As public discourse becomes more polarized, efforts to roll back diversity, equity, inclusion, initiatives, the increasing wave of book bans and all of that which we talk about here, these trends mirror the very simplifications that warns us against where complex truths are reduced to binary narratives that maintain the status quo. The lessons to be learned from Juneteenth are not just for people of African descent but society at large. This Juneteenth let's celebrate freedom, not as a finished chapter, but as an evolving process. This day is part of an ongoing commitment to justify truth telling and moral reckoning. We all are part of the American experiment and the human family. Unless we're able to figure out what we have in common and work together again on those interests, then we all lose. I thank you for staying. I thank you for staying and listening to my unanimous consent for Juneteenth from a black perspective, male and female perspective. Thank you.

UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Rep. Tom Mannion requested Unanimous Consent of the House regarding 20th Anniversary of fighting in Iraq and addressed the House.

MOTION TO PRINT REMARKS

Rep. Giasson moved that the remarks made by Rep. Tom Mannion during Unanimous Consent be printed in the Permanent Journal.

Without objection, the Speaker ordered.

REMARKS

Representative Tom Mannion: Thank you, Mister Speaker. I was going to save this for veto day to be closer to the anniversary, but world events this past week have motivated me to rise today. On October 19, 2005, 6.5 miles from the Syrian border along the Euphrates, 3rd Battalion, 6th Marine Kilo Company, 1st Platoon, 3rd Squad was on a foot patrol along ASR Diamond in the Al-Qaim region of the Al-Anbar Province in Iraq. Random patrols throughout the community were meant to keep insurgents at bay, discourage the planting of IEDs in weapons caches, and build rapport with the community so they'd be more inclined to report suspicious activities in the area. On that day, there were warning signs. The children were acting strange. They didn't follow the patrol asking for MREs or money like most days. The shops were closed. The patrol still went on. The heads were on a swivel. But readiness and vigilance can only do so much. Blind alleys between cinderblock walls are commonplace in Iraq. I know this because I was on that patrol. I saw the car leap out of the alley, feet from Anderson. I heard the order from Thornton to shoot that MF-er. I saw Anderson fire a precision shot through the windshield into the driver's head. I witnessed the vehicle vaporize from within into a violent explosion. I don't remember the sound. I remember picking myself up from the dirt after being knocked on my ass, miraculously uninjured. I remember running up the column to a roadside ditch to roll Sanford face up. I remember he came to, thankfully alive. I remember repeatedly watching nearby rooftops for secondary attackers, as was commonplace throughout the war. I remember seeing Thornton realize he had a hole in his leg, and he sat back down to tourniquet his own wound, still giving us orders to set up a perimeter. I remember Mello screaming. He was second man in the column and caught a bunch of shrapnel in the gut. And hauntingly, I remember Hubbard exclaiming up the road, Wally's effing wasted man. Hubbard also had a wounded leg, and his adrenaline didn't allow him to feel. Wally was the nickname of Lance Corporal Norman Anderson III, our point man, killed in action. Later, it was determined by EOD team in the Battalion QRF that the SVBID's hood release was wired as a dead man switch. Wally's lightning-fast acquisition of the target in single shot saved the lives of every other member of the squad, myself included. Some of us have scars, both physical and psychological, but we are alive today because of the bravery and skill of that one man. I've dedicated that life to speaking out against warmongering, advocating for tempered approaches, and skepticism towards the claims made by our intelligence agencies in the Pentagon. I ask you to join me in skepticism towards reports of weapons of mass destruction, claims that we will be welcomed as liberators, mission accomplished, assertions that there will be long-term plans for Afghanistan and Iraq, or the blatant lies like we will not put boots on the ground in Syria. I push for skepticism against the intelligence community because their mistakes, given the extreme benefit of the doubt that they were just mistakes, cost the lives of the men and women whose patriotism drove them to join our all-volunteer military. We should not recklessly take advantage of that patriotism. We should not send them into harm's way unless absolutely necessary to protect the lives of American citizens here at home. I did not enlist after 9-11 to enact regime change in Iraq, and I'd venture a guess it would be rare to find soldiers, sailors, airmen, or marines that told

their recruiters their explicit reason for signing up in the last few years was to march on Tehran. So, when people chest thump on Facebook and Twitter and have whataboutism arguments about previous Presidents' actions over the last several decades of constant war through all of the administrations, remember the 2002 AUMF for Iraq passed bipartisanly 296 to 133 due to political pressure from the people. Remember how certain the intelligence community was about the manufacture of weapons of mass destruction. Remember the lies about Saddam being in league with Bin Laden. Remember how most of the pundits and talking heads that pushed for the Iraq War cheered it on have since recanted. Remember that we never even passed an AUMF for Syria despite putting boots on the ground, and Al-Qaeda is currently killing Alawites and Christians each day since we assisted them taking the country from the Assad regime. Remember, Iran is bigger than Iraq and Afghanistan combined in both land area and population, with the worst features of both. I ask that you remember this unanimous consensus when I rise before you again in January. I ask that you remember the sacrifice of the men and women that continue to volunteer to wear the uniform. I ask you to pray and speak loudly for peace, and to bring our troops home from places they shouldn't be and out of harm's way. And finally, I ask you to remember Lance Corporal Norman Wally Anderson III, the man that saved my life and squad mates 20 years ago. Thank you.

REMARKS

Representative Georges: Thank you, Mister Speaker. Mister Speaker, Members of the House, this coming Monday, June 30, 2025, is Independence Day in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and for the worldwide diaspora of Congolese people. On June 30, 1960, 65 years ago, the DRC broke free from the yoke of colonialism and won its independence from the Kingdom of Belgium. On that day, the first Prime Minister of the DRC, Patrice Lumumba, spoke to a free Congolese people for the first time. He asked them to make today, this 30th day of June, 1960, an illustrious day which will be marked forever in your hearts. A date whose significance you will pass on with pride to your children who in turn will pass on to their children and their grandchildren the glorious story of our struggle for liberty. Mister Speaker, I stand before you as the first elected official in the United States who was born in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. In 1993, I moved from Massachusetts to New Hampshire, and I have spent 30 years serving these people of New Hampshire, but my thoughts are never far from the people of the Congo. Tragically, the liberty that Patrice Lumumba

announced in June, 1960 has not come to pass. Prime Minister Lumumba was assassinated just six months later, and the Congolese began a long history of a military corps, brutal dictatorship and the civil wars that continue to the present day. The situation in the DRC is a moral and a humanitarian crisis. Decades of conflict have ravaged various regions of the country. The suffering falls hardest on the women and the children. The use of rape and the sexual violence against women by armed militias is widespread. Children are forcibly recruited as soldiers or work in the mine. The DRC is rich with vast mineral resources. Diamond, gold, cadmium, uranium, 70% of the world's reserve of cobalt, wealth that should be used to enrich the life of all the people of the Congo. But instead, the DRC is full of widespread corruption that steals the nation's wealth, and they leave its people to live under constant threat of violence and exploitation without decent roads, schools, electricity, sanitation or clean water and to die in poverty and starvation. Many Americans may be surprised to learn of the deep connection between the Congolese people and the Americans on early history and to its later industrial and technological development. Nearly half of the enslaved people who were forcefully transported to the Americas during the slave trade came from present day DRC and Angola. Today, people of African descent in the Americas have the most genetic connection to Angola and the DRC. The Congo's supply of rubber and the minerals fueled the industry innovation of late 19th century and the early 20th century America. Congolese uranium was used in the atomic bombs that America used to end World War II. In most recent years, the drive for the mineral use in American computer processors, cell phones and the electricity vehicle has fueled the armed conflict, and the violence arrested in Eastern Congo. America has grown and prospered for centuries at the expense of the people of the Democratic Republic of the Congo. But it does not have to be this way. The United States can make a different choice to use its economic pressure to help the Congolese people and to bring about democracy change. We have a chance to help the Congolese people to achieve the dream that Prime Minister Lumumba laid out for them 65 years ago. This is the moment for America to be on the right side of DRC history. This can be the moment in history when there is a shift away from outside power exploiting the Congolese people and the mineral wealth, and toward a collaborative partnership between the United States and the Congo, where both of our great countries and the great people can all benefit. The time for action is now. Mister Speaker, I ask for the unanimous consent of the House to recognize this 65th anniversary of DRC Independence Day and I ask each of you to make a commitment to support the initiative that fosters unity, development, and peace in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Thank you, Mister Speaker.

I just want to take a minute to address the language earlier today calling a female member a gentleman. Using this language demeans and erases our colleagues and echoes a pattern we've seen across the country where trans and non-binary people are ridiculed, legislated against, and stripped of their dignity, often under the guise of debate. This Chamber is not immune from violence, from the violence of anti-trans rhetoric. When a member intentionally misgenders a colleague, it sends a message, not just to folks in this Chamber, but to every trans and gender diverse person watching. It sends the message you don't belong here; you don't deserve respect. So I want to tell you, whether you're listening in this Chamber or beyond, you do belong here. Our trans neighbors do belong here and in the Granite State. They deserve respect, they deserve safety, and they deserve representation in these Halls. This is about human dignity, and this body should be united in upholding the dignity of every Member in our Chamber and every Granite Stater. To my colleague who was targeted, I stand with you. And to all trans Granite Staters and their loved ones, know this. We see you; we love you, and we will not stay silent while you are under attack. We can disagree on policy, but we should never debate someone's humanity. Thank you.

REMARKS

Representative Prudhomme-O'Brien: Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. This is a very difficult thing for me to talk about, but I thought about this last month. Last month was May. May is Foster Care Awareness Month. There are no flags. There are no parades. There are no symbols of any kind that I am aware of. I'm going to try to be positive. I made a list. I've been making a list for a very long time about the positive things I can say about my time in foster care. I had excellent social workers. I think they were very professional, very kind. I loved them very much. They're doing God's work on earth. I think it was a good experience in the sense that it made me question my entire childhood and make it better for my family that I had, that I created myself. I can't remember. There was one other one. I can't remember it right now. I'm sorry. Very nervous. This is very difficult. I want to explain something. It is a real-life experience that I went through. I was placed in a group foster care home when I was a teenager. I was never in trouble with the law. I did not have a mental health crisis. I fell through the cracks. It took a long time for my social worker to find a placement for me because I feel like people really question why a teenager is in foster care or in need of a home. So there's a lot of sense that it's my fault. I've had a long time to think about this. That was not my fault. When I was placed in the group home, it was an entirely female home. I think you can understand why a lot of people end up in foster care. Sexual abuse is a huge reason. The woman that ran the foster home told me that the state, and this was the state of Massachusetts, was putting a lot of pressure on her to accept males into the home. And that in the past, males basically sexually assaulted the females when they were sleeping. This was a concern that she had because it happened in the past. That is when I fled, and I had to do things that I think are just, looking back on it, just really pathetic and sad and kids should not have to go through that stuff. But that is my real-life experience. That is what happens to women who do not get, females who do not get access to safe spaces. This is a real-life thing that did happen to me. Okay? I think that that's something that has come up a lot in this Session, this issue and it's something we should consider and think about. And I'm sick of being invisible about it. And that's how I felt as a child, and that's how I felt for a long time and why it's been so hard to talk about this. But it's true, it happened, and I thank you very much for listening. Thank you.

The link authorized by this subparagraph shall not allow the department of state or election officials direct access to the motor vehicle registration or driver's license records maintained by the division of motor vehicles; ***provided that such link shall authorize the department of state to identify voter records with out-of-state driver's license information where the record cannot be matched to an in-state driver's license obtained within the deadline provided in RSA 263:35. The secretary of state shall authorize the release of information from the voter database necessary for the department of safety to notify an individual pursuant to RSA 263:35, II.*** The commissioner of safety may authorize the release of information from motor vehicle registration and driver's

license records to the extent that the information is necessary to department of state and department of safety cooperation in a joint notification to individuals of apparent discrepancies in their records [and] to the extent that the information is necessary to resolve those discrepancies **or to complete voter registration**. The commissioner of safety and the secretary of state are authorized to enter into an agreement that establishes the services to be provided by the department of safety and the cost for those services. The department of safety shall not be required to provide any services under this subparagraph unless an agreement is in place and there are sufficient funds in the election fund to pay the cost for the services. The system shall facilitate the **completion**, identification, and correction of voter registration records, **including but not limited to** [whenever] **when** a registered voter has died or has been disenfranchised pursuant to part I, article 11 of the New Hampshire constitution or RSA 654:5 through RSA 654:6, or when the domicile address does not match the address provided by the same individual to the department of safety **or to verify citizenship for voter registration**.
