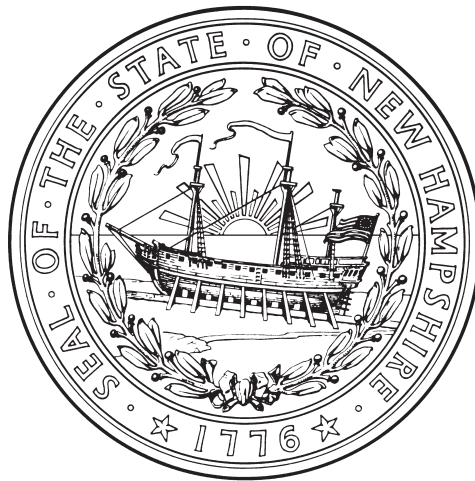

SB 37, by Senator Birdsell

CHILDREN AND FAMILY LAW

SB 22-FN, relative to disclosure of criminal history and criminal records to the child care licensing unit of the department of health and human services.

Ought to Pass, Vote 3-0. Senator Sullivan for the committee.

This bill gives DHHS direct access to the state police records system, so that they are able to conduct background investigations for individuals looking to work within the childcare system in New Hampshire. It expands the current language to capture people who have been charged with a crime but not yet convicted so that it will appear on their criminal record.

COMMERCE

SB 24, allowing students under age 21 to taste wine in educational settings.

Ought to Pass, Vote 6-0. Senator Innis for the committee.

This bill would allow students under age 21 to taste wine, beer, and other products, in certain educational settings. Students who participate in these sip and spit tastings would be supervised extensively. At the beginning of each semester that the course is offered, the Liquor Commission would provide a training program. The course and the training would provide students with an understanding of the risks and benefits of alcohol consumption and how to be responsible users of alcohol as well as identifying its health effects and how to identify those who have been overserved.

SB 52, relative to default provisions in New Hampshire trusts.

Ought to Pass, Vote 6-0. Senator Innis for the committee.

This bill would prevent a beneficiary of a trust from removing a trustee or fiduciary and replacing them with a relative or subordinate; expand the scope of whom may be considered a trustee under RSA 564-B:8-814. III; and repeal limitations imposed on certain trustees who are also beneficiaries. The New Hampshire Trust Code has default and mandatory provisions. Specifically, this bill would amend the default provisions to better align them with IRS rules. With this backstop in place, it will help to avoid inadvertent omissions in trust documents.

SB 67-FN, relative to workers' compensation and resolution of payment disputes.

Ought to Pass, Vote 6-0. Senator McGough for the committee.

This bill would establish a 90-day time limit for applying to the Commissioner of the Department of Labor to resolve disputes regarding the reasonable value of services provided. Currently, a provider has an unlimited amount of time to dispute charges paid by a self-insured group. The issue has been providers disputing claims after a long period of time, sometimes years later, despite surplus money having already been returned to the self-insured members. This bill would not change the right of a provider to dispute a payment, eliminate the requirement a self-insured group pay the reasonable value of services, or alter the 30-day deadline for payment to a provider.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS AND ADMINISTRATION

SB 28, relative to workers' compensation claims involving emergency responders with acute stress disorder or post-traumatic stress disorder.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Reardon for the committee.

SB 28 provides that "date of injury" for purposes of workers' compensation claims by emergency responders with acute stress disorder or post-traumatic stress disorder shall be determined in accordance with the statute governing date of injury for occupational disease or cumulative trauma. This bill would help first responders seek help to address the trauma accumulated throughout their careers.

SB 29, relative to membership, jurisdiction, and reports of the health care workplace safety commission and relative to health care facility reporting requirements under the workplace violence prevention program.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Gannon for the committee.

SB 29 adds a representative of Hampstead hospital to the health care workplace safety commission, requires monthly reporting of incidents to the department of labor, repeals an exemption for state operated health care facilities from jurisdiction of the commission, and clarifies that annual reports of the commission are not confidential. The bill is a request of the health care workplace safety commission.

SB 31-FN, establishing an apprentice guide license.

Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Pearl for the committee.

SB 31 establishes an apprentice guide license. This bill is a request of the fish and game department. The committee amendment added language to ensure that an apprentice guide license holder has the proper license for the activity they will be assisting with.

Additional requirements for an individual to qualify for the apprentice guide license shall include passing a criminal background check and certification in first-aid and CPR before an application may be submitted. A person holding a valid apprentice guide license, along with the proper license for the activity they will be assisting with, may guide in activities, including hunting or fishing, only when accompanied by a properly licensed guide who is 18 years of age or older. The fees for a resident or non-resident apprentice guide license shall be set in rules pursuant to RSA 541-A, as provided in RSA 215:4.

SB 32 allows public hearing notices to be posted digitally on newspaper websites, allows the shooting of injured or crippled waterfowl from a motorized watercraft, removes the word “brook” from the reference to trout in the method and manner of taking fish, enables the executive director of fish and game to set the fisheries habitat fee in rules, and repeals the Connecticut River Atlantic Salmon Commission. This bill was a request of the fish and game department.

At the biennial hearings held at Concord and Lancaster and at other public hearings that the executive director shall hold in accordance with the provisions of this section, any person having any testimony to present which bears upon the power and authority of the executive director under the provisions of this title shall be given full opportunity to be heard, and the executive director shall cause a complete record to be kept of all testimony taken.

SB 61-FN, relative to prescriptions for state prisoners paid for by the department of corrections.

Ought to Pass, Vote 3-0. Senator Reardon for the committee.

SB 61 permits the department of corrections to enter into purchasing agreements with drug manufacturers, if that agreement is cost beneficial to the state. This also eliminates the requirement for notification to be completed in the pharmacist's own handwriting.

SB 68, adding a member to the governor's commission on disability.

Ought to Pass, Vote 3-0. Senator Altschiller for the committee.

SB 68 adds the coordinator of the program for the deaf and the hard of hearing as an ex officio member on the governor's commission on disability. This bill fosters inclusivity for deaf and hard of hearing citizens in decision making.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

SB 18, permitting the commissioner of health and human services to authorize additional beds for a pediatric intermediate care facility under certain circumstances.

Ought to Pass, Vote 5-0. Senator Birdsell for the committee.

This bill allows the commissioner of Health and Human Services to increase the bed capacity of a pediatric intermediate care facility with the approval of the Joint Fiscal Committee. With only one such facility currently in the State, this will assist in more efficiently addressing the current and future demand for intermediate care-level services. Therefore, we recommend this bill ought to pass.

SB 47, requiring certain health insurance policies of a birth mother to provide coverage for a newly born child from the moment of birth.

Ought to Pass with Amendment, Vote 5-0. Senator Birdsell for the committee.

This bill makes a birth mother's health insurance policy the primary policy for a newborn child's health care unless the mother has no insurance or coverage under an employer-sponsored health plan. Existing statute ensures that a child falls under their parent's insurance policy for the first 31 days of their life, and the Insurance Department has issued guidance on the application of this statute. This bill further codifies the Department's interpretation. A committee amendment was adopted to amend the bill's effective date. Therefore, we recommend this bill ought to pass with amendment.

(b) The department, to facilitate the enforcement of this paragraph and to aid in providing notice to the public and visitors of invalid licenses, shall maintain on its website a list of out-of-state classes of driver's licenses that are invalid in this state. The department shall update this list no later than annually. Any state on this list may contact the department to have themselves removed from the list if the state can demonstrate in that state's laws or regulations that the type of license listed on the department's website is not issued exclusively to undocumented immigrants.

(c) Any person in violation of this statute shall be guilty of a violation. For a second or subsequent offense, the person shall be guilty of a class B misdemeanor.
